Dear Friends,

What a year it has been! COVID brought uncertainty to all our lives last year. We spent most of the last 18 months trying to understand what was going on, what was happening next, how we could prepare to deal with it and wondering - scared - if we were going to be ok.

These high levels of uncertainty are too familiar to the hundreds of children in foster care in our area. They live feeling unseen, unheard, and unimportant, and COVID just made it worse for them. It is impossible to overstate our appreciation for the commitment of our amazing volunteers, our generous donors and supporters, and our dedicated staff who helped make this a remarkable year even as we faced unique challenges created by the COVID-19 pandemic. We are happy to share these highlights:

- We served 124 children, a 10% increase over last year
- We recruited, trained, and activated 18 new CASA Volunteers
- 56 CASA Volunteers served 124 children and contributed 4,499 hours to their advocacy work

We want to take a moment to celebrate these successes and honor all of you while recognizing the adversity and difficulties magnified by the pandemic that confronts the children we serve. The child welfare system became overwhelmed during COVID. Essential services and support were either suspended or reduced for months. Courts had to close, delaying cases. The emotional and mental toll on foster children has been significant. Isolation has increased their anxiety and depression. The stress created by COVID compounded the trauma they have already endured. We have yet to see how this experience will affect their development.

Through this lens, we see just how vital CASA Volunteers are in the lives of these children, as their connection and concern became imperative for ensuring the safety of children who were isolated from their teachers and friends. We are proud that our staff quickly adjusted to new ways of conducting business and assisting CASA Volunteers, and that those CASA Volunteers immediately found innovative ways to engage with children and support their caregivers.

As we rose to meet these challenges, we also reached new heights of efficiency and effectiveness to sustain and enhance our services. For example, moving recruitment information sessions, interviews, and training to virtual platforms has provided flexibility and convenience for incoming volunteers. This new digital approach also allowed the Program to expand its reach to potential volunteers. We created a new position, the Program Engagement Manager. This staff member increases our capacity to recruit new volunteer advocates while keeping our existing volunteers. We also opened a full-time Advocate Manager position in Harrisonburg. Additionally, we underwent a strategic planning process that produced a 10-year vision to achieve our long-term goals.

While we work to spread our mission and engage with new community members, we recognize to best serve abused and neglected children and their families, we must be a culturally responsive, equitable, and inclusive organization. We are focused on collaborating with community leaders to ensure we are taking the proper steps forward to better represent the children we serve and create positive change that helps build a better future for abused and neglected children of all backgrounds.






Our Commitment to Diversity, Equity, & Inclusion

By denouncing systemic inequities and striving to be better, we can Change a Child's Story and build a better future for abused and neglected children of all backgrounds in our community.




Cities & Counties Served Within Virginia

38 had a CASA volunteer


58 needed CASA's advocacy

Why Advocacy Matters



"While sitting as a judge in juvenile court, I realized there was no one in the courtroom whose only job was to provide a voice for the children. Forty years later, hundreds of thousands of volunteers have spoken up for millions of children. The idea has worked."

In 1977, Judge David Soukup, a Seattle juvenile court judge concerned about making drastic decisions with insufficient information, conceived the idea of citizen volunteers speaking up for the best interests of abused and neglected children in the courtroom. That first program spurred a movement that grew into a national network of Court Appointed Special Advocate (CASA) programs recruiting, training, and supporting volunteers.

Adverse Childhood Experiences (ACEs)

are potentially traumatic events that occur in childhood. They include emotional, physical, and sexual abuse, neglect, and household abuse/neglect

Death

An ACE score of **6+** can reduce life expectancy by up to **20 years**

4 or more ACEs

- 3x the levels of lung disease or adult smoking
- **14x** the number of suicide attempts
- **4.5x** more likely to develop depresssion
- the level of intravenous drug use
- **4x** as likely to have begun intercourse by age 15
- the level of liver disease

Why Advocacy Matters



RECOMMEND

Speak up for the child's best interests in court. Make recommendations regarding the child's placement and needed services, and monitor the child's situation until the case is released by the court.

During a child's time in the system, they might have dozens of social workers, attorneys, therapists, teachers and caregivers—but will have only one CASA volunteer. For many, their CASA volunteer is the one consistent person in their life.





Joyce Alexander McDonald was born on July 8, 1933, in Mt. Sidney on the kitchen table while her Aunt Ruth was making bread. After graduating from Mt. Sidney High School in 1951, she followed her passion for music and earned her Bachelor's Degree from Madison College. She was a band director at Madison County High



School and a librarian at Augusta Military Academy, where she was their first female instructor. She later returned to Madison College and earned her Master's Degree in counseling. On June 24, 1967, she married James Hugh McDonald. Joyce was a lifetime member at Salem Lutheran Church in Mt. Sidney, serving as the church organist for many years.

Upon her passing, Joyce ensured that her legacy of compassion would provide for the needs of our children for generations to come. Her estate left \$25,000 to Blue Ridge CASA for Children to fund our advocacy for abused and neglected children.
